
#### **Key Takeaways:**

### Roughly Half of Americans Trust Democrats More to Handle Health Care, Social Security, Medicare, and Medicaid

Independents trust the Democratic Party more to handle Medicaid (net +15 trust Democrats more), health care (net +21), and Social Security and Medicare (net +14).



### Only One in Four Americans Are Hearing "A Lot" About the Republicans' Proposed Budget Plan

Majorities of independents are not hearing much about the budget plan (57% say they are hearing "a little" or "nothing").

How much have you seen, read, or heard about Republicans in Congress' proposed budget plan?\*\*





### Making Clear That This Is the Republican Budget Bill, Not Just the "Big Beautiful Bill," Increases Awareness and Negativity

Pluralities of independents (46%) and a majority of non-MAGA Republicans\* (58%) are unable to rate the "One Big Beautiful Bill Act" on its own, without labeling it as the Republican budget bill (with the label, those numbers drop to 31% each).


## Pluralities Oppose the Republican Budget Plan; Referencing It As the "One Big Beautiful Bill Act" Introduces More Uncertainty

While pluralities oppose the budget plan either way, adding "also known as the 'One Big Beautiful Bill Act'" drives the share who are unable to rate it from 19% to 25%.

• Non-MAGA Republicans\* have grown increasingly unfavorable to the bill (from net +31 support in May to just net +3 now).



### Loss of Coverage and Higher Costs from GOP's Medicaid Cuts Are Deeply Concerning; Coverage Loss Elicits Greater Intensity


#### (Split Sample) How concerning do you find the following statement:

#### About the Study

Global Strategy Group conducted a public opinion survey among a sample of 1,000 registered voters from June 26-June 30, 2025. 100 additional interviews were conducted among Hispanic voters. 75 additional interviews were conducted among Asian American and Pacific Islander voters. 100 additional interviews were conducted among independent voters. The survey was conducted online, recruiting respondents from an opt-in online panel vendor. Respondents were verified against a voter file and special care was taken to ensure the demographic composition of our sample matched that of the national registered voter population across a variety of demographic variables. The margin of error for the full sample at the 95 percent level of confidence is +/- 3.1 percentage points. The margin of error for subgroups varies and is higher.
