Key Takeaways:

- Americans are divided between more isolationist and more interventionist sentiments broadly. College-educated Americans and seniors across party lines skew more interventionist, while younger Americans are more isolationist.
- Roughly half disapprove of Trump's handling of the conflict in the Middle East and foreign policy more generally, though Trump and Republicans hold notable trust advantages over Democrats to keep Americans safe and handle the conflict in the Middle East.
- Trump bombing Iran dominates what Americans are hearing about in the news, both
 positively and negatively. Americans are also divided on whether Trump made the right
 decision in bombing Iran, though nearly half say they want the U.S. to end its military
 involvement.
- Those who oppose Trump bombing Iran do so because it puts America at future risk.


 Democrats are uniquely concerned about the lack of Congressional approval for the strike.



Americans Are Divided Between Broad Interventionist and Isolationist Sentiments

Men (52%), seniors (60%), and college-educated Americans (55%) are more interventionist, while independents (45%) and younger Americans (46%) are more isolationist. Unusually, there is little difference between Democrats and Republicans on this metric.

Which statement do you agree with more, even if neither fully represents your view?






Within Both Parties, Seniors and College-Educated Americans Skew More Interventionist

Which statement do you agree with more, even if neither fully represents your view?




Isolationist Republicans Tend to Be Younger, More Non-College, Less MAGA, Less Politically Engaged

Interventionist vs. Isolationist Republicans


Interventionist Republicans: Republicans who say it's better for the U.S. to be more active and involved in world affairs (50% of GOP)


Roughly Half Disapprove of Trump's Handling of the Conflict in the Middle East and Foreign Policy More Generally

A majority of independents disapprove of both Trump's handling of foreign policy (52%) and the conflict in the Middle East (57%).

Despite Low Ratings for Trump on Foreign Policy, the GOP Hold Small Advantages on Americans' Safety, the Middle East Conflict

Americans are divided on who they trust to handle foreign policy more generally (net +3 trust Trump and the Republican party more).

• Independents trust Trump and Republicans more to handle foreign policy (net +9 trust Trump and the Republican party more), to keep Americans safe (net +17), and to handle the conflict in the Middle East (net +3).

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

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Trump and Republicans' Trust Advantage Over Democrats on Foreign Policy Is Waning in Light of Trump's Recent Decisions

Trump and Republicans' trust advantage has declined by a net 11 points overall since pre-inauguration in early January (from net -14 trust the Democratic Party more to net -3), including a 17-point net shift among Democrats (from net +52 to net +69), a 5-point net shift among independents (from net -14 to net -9), and even a 7-point net shift among Republicans (from net -83 to net -76).


Nearly One in Five Americans Are Unsure of Who to Trust More on Foreign Policy: Democrats or Trump and Republicans

High shares of independents (41% are unsure), those unfavorable to both parties (30%), non-conservative independents and Republicans (30%), moderates (29%), and passive news consumers (24%) say they don't know which party to trust more on foreign policy.



A Majority of Americans Are Hearing "A Lot" About the Middle East Conflict, and Three in Four Are Concerned About It



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Americans Are Divided on Whether Trump Made the Right Decision in Bombing Iran

Democrats (net -54 right decision), independents (net -14), isolationist Americans* (net -8), and younger Americans (net -13) say Trump made the wrong choice. Foreign policy conflicted Americans** are largely unsure (35% not sure).



About Navigator

Navigator is designed to act as a consistent, flexible, responsive tool to inform policy debates by conducting research and reliable guidance to inform allies, elected leaders, and the press. Navigator is a project led by pollsters from Global Strategy Group and GBAO along with an advisory committee, including: Jessica Floyd, The Hub Project; Christina Reynolds; Mike Podhorzer; Jesse Ferguson, progressive strategist; Navin Nayak; Stephanie Valencia, EquisLabs; and Melanie Newman, Planned Parenthood Action Fund.

About the Study

Global Strategy Group conducted a public opinion survey among a sample of 1,000 registered voters from June 26-June 30, 2025. 100 additional interviews were conducted among Hispanic voters. 75 additional interviews were conducted among Asian American and Pacific Islander voters. 100 additional interviews were conducted among independent voters. The survey was conducted online, recruiting respondents from an opt-in online panel vendor. Respondents were verified against a voter file and special care was taken to ensure the demographic composition of our sample matched that of the national registered voter population across a variety of demographic variables. The margin of error for the full sample at the 95 percent level of confidence is +/- 3.1 percentage points. The margin of error for subgroups varies and is higher.
