#### **Key Takeaways:**

- Americans are most likely to describe Texas Republicans' move to redistrict as a "power grab" and Republicans "rigging the system to hold onto power."




## Just a Third Are Hearing "a Lot" About Texas GOP's Redistricting Efforts; a Majority Are Concerned, Especially Liberal Democrats



#### Half of Americans Oppose Texas Republican Lawmakers' Redistricting Efforts

A plurality of independents (44%) oppose recent redistricting efforts (net -23 support), as do a third of non-MAGA Republicans\* (35%).


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## Additional Context on Texas GOP's Redistricting Efforts Increases Opposition Among Democrats and Independents

This rare, mid-decade effort of Texas lawmakers to redraw the state's Congressional map is meant to benefit Trump and Republicans in Congress by allowing them to pick up more seats and pad their slim majority in the House. 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

Navigator is designed to act as a consistent, flexible, responsive tool to inform policy debates by conducting research and reliable guidance to inform allies, elected leaders, and the press. #### About the Study

Global Strategy Group conducted a public opinion survey among a sample of 1,000 registered voters from August 7-August 11, 2025. 100 additional interviews were conducted among Hispanic voters. 100 additional interviews were conducted among African American voters. 77 additional interviews were conducted among Asian American and Pacific Islander voters. 100 additional interviews were conducted among independent voters. The survey was conducted online, recruiting respondents from an opt-in online panel vendor. Respondents were verified against a voter file and special care was taken to ensure the demographic composition of our sample matched that of the national registered voter population across a variety of demographic variables. The margin of error for the full sample at the 95 percent level of confidence is +/- 3.1 percentage points. The margin of error for subgroups varies and is higher.

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
