
- News about the government shutdown is breaking through across the political spectrum, though slightly less so with independents.
- Americans blame Trump and Republicans in Congress more than Democrats in Congress for the shutdown, though one in five blame both equally. Those who do not currently blame one side more than the other are disproportionately independents, moderates, and dislike both parties.
- A plurality of Americans want to see Democrats in Congress stand up to President Trump.
 And, when the debate is put into health care terms, pluralities want to see Democrats hold their ground rather than compromise, even if it means the shutdown continues.
- Democrats hold a trust advantage over Trump and Republicans on health care, as Americans report hearing positive information about Democrats in Congress on health care. Medicaid remains overwhelmingly popular, and the Affordable Care Act is viewed positively by both Democrats and Republicans alike (while views of Obamacare are more polarized).



Nearly Twice as Many Are Hearing About the Shutdown Compared to Share Hearing About a Potential One in September

Just over half of independents (55%) and shutdown persuadables*** (56%) report hearing "a lot" or "some" about the shutdown.

How much have you seen, read, or heard about the current government shutdown?





Americans Blame Trump and Republicans in Congress More Than Democrats for the Current Government Shutdown

When asked without any follow-up questions, 22% of Americans blame both parties equally for the shutdown, including 35% of independents and 34% of non-MAGA Republicans*. With follow-up questions included, 32% of Americans blame Democrats and 45% Trump and Republicans, for a net +13 blame Trump and Republicans.


Roughly One in Four Americans Are Conflicted on Who to Blame More for the Government Shutdown


Nearly one in four Americans (23%) blame neither party, both parties equally, or don't know enough to say on the government shutdown. Groups that are disproportionally likely to include shutdown persuadables are independents (57% are shutdown persuadables), Americans unfavorable to both parties (37%), non-MAGA Republicans* (35%), younger women (33%), and passive news consumers**(28%).

Demographic Composition of Shutdown Persuadables:







Shutdown Figures Are Underwater Across Party Lines

Independents are more unfavorable than favorable toward each figure and group tested, with the most negative ratings for the Democratic Party (net -43 favorable), followed by Donald Trump (net -27).




On Both Democrats and Republicans, the Government Shutdown Dominates Negative Information Heard




Trump's Overall and Economic Approval Ratings Remain Negative; His Economic Rating Continues to Decline

Do you approve or disapprove of the way Donald Trump is handling the economy?








Americans Divided on Who Is Trying to Keep the Government Open; Democrats Seen Doing Slightly More to Do So Than GOP





Two in Three Say That the Shutdown Will Have a Negative Impact on the Country, Half Say on Themselves







Americans Want Compromise Over a Shutdown, Though More Say Trump and the GOP Need to Compromise Than Democrats

More Democrats want to see their party hold their ground (68%) than Republicans do on their party (54%).

• A majority of non-MAGA Republicans* (55%) want to see Trump and Republicans compromise with Democrats to end the shutdown.








Making the Fight About Health Care Shifts Americans in Favor of a Shutdown Rather Than Compromising to Reopen

Groups especially likely to say Democrats should hold their ground (even if it means the government shutdown continues) when health care is involved include independents (from net +13 compromise without health care to net -29 with), non-MAGA Republicans* (from net +59 to net +31), and shutdown persuadables* (from net +40 to net 0).


Democrats should hold



Americans Say the Democratic Party Is More Focused on the Right Things Than the Republican Party, Though Views Are Mixed

Independents rate the parties equally negatively (net -14 focused on the right things each), while Republicans rate the Democratic Party less negatively (net -56) than Democrats rate the Republican Party (net -75).

Views of Medicaid and the ACA Are Positive Across Party Lines; Obamacare Is Net Positive, But Sees Some Polarization

Both Democrats (net +82 favorable) and Republicans (net +44) view Medicaid deeply favorably. Both parties are positive on the ACA (net +77 for Democrats, net +4 for Republicans), while Obamacare views are divided by party (net +83 for Democrats, net -39 for Republicans).

Navigator is designed to act as a consistent, flexible, responsive tool to inform policy debates by conducting research and reliable guidance to inform allies, elected leaders, and the press. Navigator is a project led by pollsters from Global Strategy Group and GBAO along with an advisory committee, including: Jessica Floyd, The Hub Project; Christina Reynolds; Mike Podhorzer; Jesse Ferguson, progressive strategist; Navin Nayak; Stephanie Valencia, EquisLabs; and Melanie Newman, Planned Parenthood Action Fund.

About the Study

Global Strategy Group conducted a public opinion survey among a sample of 1,000 registered voters from October 2-October 5, 2025. The survey was conducted online, recruiting respondents from an opt-in online panel vendor. Respondents were verified against a voter file and special care was taken to ensure the demographic composition of our sample matched that of the national registered voter population across a variety of demographic variables. The margin of error for the full sample at the 95 percent level of confidence is +/- 3.1 percentage points. The margin of error for subgroups varies and is higher.
