Messaging on the Government Shutdown: A Guide for Advocates



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Key Takeaways:

- The ongoing harms of the shutdown that trouble Americans most are millions missing paychecks. On those to come, economic fallout broadly, followed by delayed/diminished care for veterans, military families, kids, and pregnant women are most concerning.
- Americans worry more about rising health care costs than the shutdown on its own.
 Highlighting real numbers that impact broad populations cost hikes across the board and millions losing coverage land best, rather than targeted data points and technical language.
- Groups like seniors, cancer survivors, veterans, Americans with disabilities, and children are especially sympathetic victims of Republicans' health care policies.
- Democrats in Congress are positioned for positive views if they successfully defend health care in the shutdown: should they fail, they will take some heat.



Messaging Guidance:

Dos

- ✓ Focus on health care. Health care costs rising and Americans losing health care coverage remain the most concerning aspects of this shutdown, and stopping these outcomes is the top priority Americans have for Democrats in Congress. Keeping the debate on this terrain is crucial.
- ✓ Keep the data points on health care harms broad in impact and specific in scope. Americans are deeply concerned about millions of Americans losing health care, as well as costs doubling/increasing by 114%.
- ✓ Make it personal by highlighting specific stories. Lean into the impacts on sympathetic groups: seniors, cancer survivors and people with chronic illnesses, veterans and military families, Americans with disabilities, and children.
- ✓ Make sure to drive home this is Trump and Republicans' shutdown. Emphasize that they have control of the White House and Congress and refuse to negotiate and will only pass a bill that cuts health care/raises health care costs.
 - Highlight shutdown consequences with impact. Lead with already missed paychecks and that many will never receive that pay, and follow with potential for broad economic damage and delayed/diminished care and benefits for veterans, military families, pregnant women, and children.

Don'ts

- × Stray too far from health care. The past two waves of Navigator research confirm that keeping the conversation to health care is the best message for progressives.
- × Lean as much on wonky policy without impacts for people. Highlighting "enhanced premium tax credits" without explaining that they make health care more affordable will fail to reach Americans where they are/what they know.
- Narrow the impact. Pointing to harms from Republicans' health care policies at the broadest level/greatest scope is key – rather than communicating on just rural communities or other groups (helpful to highlight, but it must be in tandem with the broader consequences that more Americans will feel).
- × Focus only on impacts on doctors and providers. More Americans are patients than providers: including doctors and providers works, as long as the focus remains on patients and families first.



Most Concerning From Shutdown So Far: Failure to Pay Millions

Shutdown persuadables** are most concerned about millions not receiving their paychecks (54%), services for veterans and Social Security recipients stopping (39%), and critical food safety inspections stopping (29%).

Blocking Cuts to Health Care and Increases in Health Care Costs Are Most Important Priorities for Democrats in Congress

Democrats' Success in Protecting Healthcare in the Shutdown Has High Stakes


While independents say they would be net +31 favorable towards Democrats' handling if they succeed, they will be net -24 if they fail.



About the Study

Global Strategy Group conducted a public opinion survey among a sample of 1,000 registered voters from October 9-October 13, 2025. The survey was conducted online, recruiting respondents from an opt-in online panel vendor. Respondents were verified against a voter file and special care was taken to ensure the demographic composition of our sample matched that of the national registered voter population across a variety of demographic variables. The margin of error for the full sample at the 95 percent level of confidence is +/- 3.1 percentage points. The margin of error for subgroups varies and is higher.

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
