

Key takeaways:

- Lack of preparedness remains the biggest concern for Americans.
- Despite a popular narrative, Trump has not experienced a sustained approval bump, especially in comparison to other Governors and leaders.




Trump Voters Increasingly Dissatisfied With Early Response

40% of 2016 Trump voters say the president did not take coronavirus seriously enough early in the crisis, up 17 points since early last week.

- 66% of independents and 66% of Americans overall say the same, a 10-point increase from last week.
- 53% of Trump voters say Trump got it "about right" initially, down 7 points. 1% say he overreacted.

Percentage who say Donald Trump "did not take it seriously enough" when coronavirus first began spreading:






"Downplaying" When He Should Have Been Preparing

There's been a 7-point increase since March 23rd in the percentage of Americans saying they are seriously concerned that Trump downplayed the threat of the coronavirus early on.

Please indicate whether the following raises concerns: Donald Trump downplayed the threat of the coronavirus early on, letting it get worse when we should have been preparing.






Trump Failed to Take Action at a Critical Stage

Six in ten Americans say Trump's failure to act early raises serious concerns, with people of color especially concerned about Trump's early inaction.

- Even among white Americans with no 4-year degree, half (48%) worry the president did not act in time.
- Most independents (61%) also say they are seriously concerned about Trump's early inaction.

Please indicate whether the following raises concerns: Donald Trump failed to take the decisive action we needed to stop the virus in the early stages of the outbreak.




Most Call President Trump "Unprepared"

A clear majority of Americans say that "unprepared" applies to Trump's coronavirus response.

- The majority of white non-college Americans (53%) say that "unprepared" applies to Trump's coronavirus
 response and people of color are even more likely to agree.
- While 61% say Trump is unprepared, 52% say he is "chaotic" and "erratic," and 51% say he is "irresponsible."

Please indicate whether this word applies to Donald Trump's response to coronavirus: Unprepared






Declining Number Say Trump is "Honest"

The share of Americans who say "Honest" does not apply to Trump's coronavirus response has grown by 9 points.

• Among independents, the share who feel "honest" does not apply to the president has gone from 37% a week ago to 58% today.




Public Sees Early Missteps at Root of Current Crisis

A plurality of Americans (47%) are more concerned that Trump was unprepared and made early mistakes than they are about the lack of action right now (20%).

• Half of independents (50%) are more concerned that Trump was unprepared and made early mistakes, compared to 15% who are more concerned that he isn't taking proper actions now.

Which of the following concerns you more...






The "Trump Bump" Was Small – and Has Faded

Trump's overall approval now stands at 45%, just two points above his average approval rating in Navigator's tracking pre-coronavirus.

- This pales in comparison to approval gains seen for other leaders, such as NY Governor Andrew Cuomo (+27 approval gain in a recent <u>Siena poll</u>) and WI Governor Tony Evers (+14 according to the <u>Marquette Law Poll</u>).
- Leaders in Italy, the UK, and elsewhere around the world have also seen <u>much larger bumps</u> than Trump.






Trump Rating on Coronavirus Handling at -2

Consistent with the last week of updates, Americans are nearly evenly divided on how Trump is handling the coronavirus pandemic.

- Intensity of disapproval continued to increase in today's update (26% strongly approve; 35% strongly disapprove).
- Among independents, Trump is now underwater by 10 points (37% approve/47% disapprove), a net shift of 27 points since our March 30th update (53% approve/36% disapprove).

About the Study

Global Strategy Group conducted a public opinion survey among a sample of 997 registered voters conducted March 31-April 3, 2020. The survey was conducted online, recruiting respondents from multiple opt-in online panel vendors. Respondents were verified against a voter file and special care was taken to ensure the demographic composition of our sample matched that of the national registered voter population across a variety of demographic variables.

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
