Key takeaways:

- Most Americans have favorable views of the CDC, Dr. Fauci, and the World Health Organization (WHO), and a majority opposes defunding and withdrawing from the WHO.
- A majority view Obamacare favorably, and Democrats are more trusted than Trump to protect healthcare coverage for those with preexisting conditions.
- Helping those in need and putting regular people before the wealthy are the most appealing parts of the Democrats' approach to the economic impacts of the pandemic.



Trump Approval on Economy Hits New Low

Approval of Trump's economic handling is now underwater by a net 5 points, the lowest rating in our tracking.

- The percentage of Americans that "strongly disapprove" of Trump's economic handling has risen 11 points (from 29% to 40%) since March 23.
- Among independents, only 32% approve of his handling of the economy.

Do you approve or disapprove of the way Donald Trump is handling the economy?






CDC, Fauci, WHO Retain High Levels of Favorability

Nearly three in four Americans have a favorable opinion of the CDC, as do nearly two in three of Dr. Fauci. Despite Trump's decision to pull the United States out of the WHO, a majority have a favorable impression of the WHO.

• Republicans who watch Fox News are driving lower levels of favorability toward the World Health Organization, with a net favorability of -38 (27% favorable/65% unfavorable).



Majority Oppose Defunding and Withdrawing from the WHO

More than half oppose Trump's decision to withdraw from and discontinue funding for the World Health Organization.

• Among those with mixed views on Trump*, 52% oppose his attempts to withdraw from and defund the WHO.




Public Favorable Towards "Obamacare"

The majority of Americans have favorable views of Obamacare, including a plurality of independents.

- The "Affordable Care Act" (57% last week) remains a more favorable phrase than "Obamacare" (51% this week), but this is mostly driven by Republicans.
- This comes as the majority of Americans (57%) say that Trump's attempts to cut health care and repeal the Affordable Care Act, instead of expanding coverage, have made the impacts of the pandemic worse.






Democrats More Trusted On Issues Relating to Pandemic

Please indicate who you would trust more to handle each one.






Democrats Hold Lead on "Safely" Reopening the Country

As you may know, different Democrats have said different things about reopening the country. Which of the following do you find most appealing?



Across party lines, Americans see getting economic relief to people who need it as the most appealing part of the Democrats' approach to the economy, followed by putting regular people before big corporations and CEOs.

About the Study

Global Strategy Group conducted a public opinion survey among a sample of 1,007 registered voters conducted May 28-June 1, 2020. The survey was conducted online, recruiting respondents from multiple opt-in online panel vendors. Respondents were verified against a voter file and special care was taken to ensure the demographic composition of our sample matched that of the national registered voter population across a variety of demographic variables.
