


Majority Continue to Oppose Reopening Schools

About three in five continue to oppose reopening schools, up 23 points from June 1.

• Among parents, opposition has increased by 26 points since June 1 (from 31% to 57%). Among those in high infection states, it has increased by 22 points (from 35% to 57%).

^{*&}quot;Parents" are those who self-report having a child/children under the age of 18. "High infection states" are those that fall under the NY travel restriction list, based on a "seven day rolling average of positive tests in excess of 10%, or number of positive cases exceeding 10 per 10,000 residents." Two-Thirds Support Restoring the Expanded Unemployment Insurance

A majority continue to support expanded unemployment insurance until at least January 2021, with nearly two in five who "strongly support" continuing expanded benefits.

• Among those mixed on Trump*, 51% support continuing expanded unemployment compensation.

As you may know, earlier this year Congress passed an expansion of federal unemployment compensation providing as much as \$600 a week in additional relief due to the coronavirus pandemic. This expansion expired in July.

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


Americans See Democrats as for Middle and Working Class People

A majority feel Trump and his administration's policies favor the wealthy and big corporations, while a majority feel Democrats in Congress's policies favor middle and working class people.

• Since the question was first asked on March 23, the share who feel that Trump's policies favor the wealthy and big corporations has grown 11 points (from 42% to 53%).

Top Concerns on Trump's Handling of Economic Recovery: Ignoring Experts, Giving Big Corporations Bailouts

Trump ignoring health experts and economists is a top concern for more than two in five Americans, while nearly a third say Trump giving bailouts to big corporations instead of helping small businesses is a top concern.

Among those mixed on Trump*, 45% are concerned he is ignoring health experts and economists.

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



Middling Support for Proposal to Ban TikTok in the United States

Amidst security concerns about the app and Trump's executive order giving the app 45 days to find an American buyer, two in five support banning TikTok.

• Among parents or grandparents of TikTok users, nearly half (45%) support banning the app, while among users, only one in five (18%) support banning the app.

About the Study

Global Strategy Group conducted public opinion surveys among a sample of 1,019 registered voters from August 6-10, 2020. 200 additional interviews were conducted among African American voters. 200 additional interviews were conducted among independents with no partisan lean. The survey was conducted online, recruiting respondents from multiple opt-in online panel vendors. Respondents were verified against a voter file and special care was taken to ensure the demographic composition of our sample matched that of the national registered voter population across a variety of demographic variables.

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
