


Over Three-Quarters of Americans View Climate as a Serious Problem Both Now and for Future Generations



And how serious a problem do you think climate change will become for your children or for future generations of your family?








Majority of Americans Have Become More Supportive of Transitioning to Clean Sources of Energy

Have you become more or less supportive of transitioning to cleaner sources of energy over the last few years, or has your opinion not changed?







Strong Majorities Support Clean Energy Investments in the "American Jobs Plan"



Net Support (Supp-Opp)



A Progressive Argument Including Traditional Infrastructure Plus "Investing in Clean Energy" Increases Effectiveness

Both progressive arguments to include climate easily beat a conservative argument to focus on "traditional" infrastructure, but the progressive side is stronger with an explicit mention of "clean energy."

Outside of Pandemic, Addressing Climate Change is a Top **Priority for Democrats**

Navigator is designed to act as a consistent, flexible, responsive tool to inform policy debates by conducting research and reliable guidance to inform allies, elected leaders, and the press. About the Study

Global Strategy Group conducted public opinion surveys among a sample of 1,204 registered voters from May 20-May 24, 2021. 149 additional interviews were conducted among Hispanic voters. 194 additional interviews were conducted among Asian American and Pacific Islander voters. 100 additional interviews were conducted among independent voters. The survey was conducted online, recruiting respondents from an opt-in online panel vendor. Respondents were verified against a voter file and special care was taken to ensure the demographic composition of our sample matched that of the national registered voter population across a variety of demographic variables.
