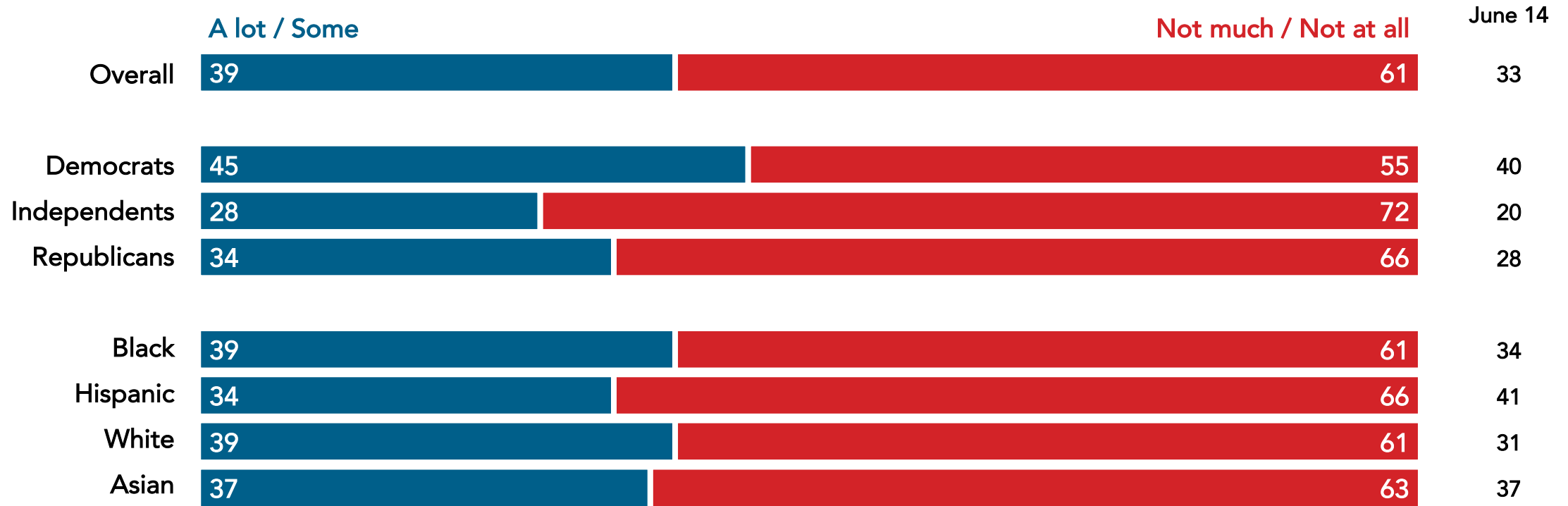


Awareness of For the People Act Only Slightly Increased During Senate Consideration

While awareness rose 6 points since before the Senate Republican filibuster of considering the For the People Act, more than six in ten Americans reported not hearing much or anything at all about it (61%).

How much have you seen, read, or heard recently about the For the People Act?

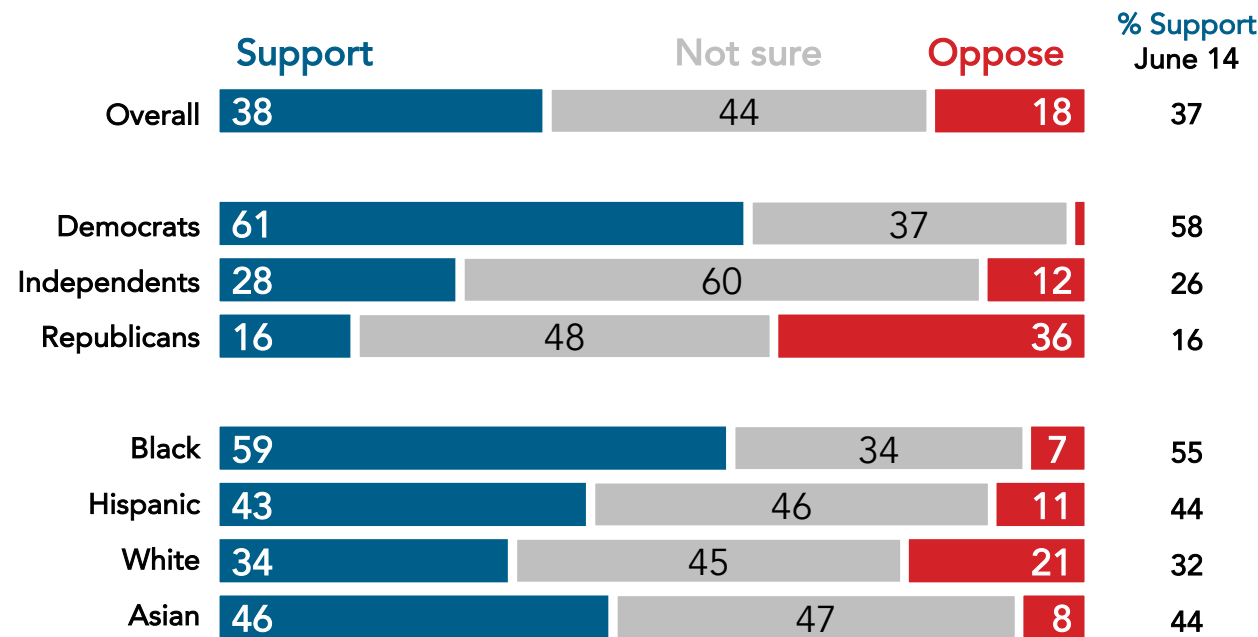

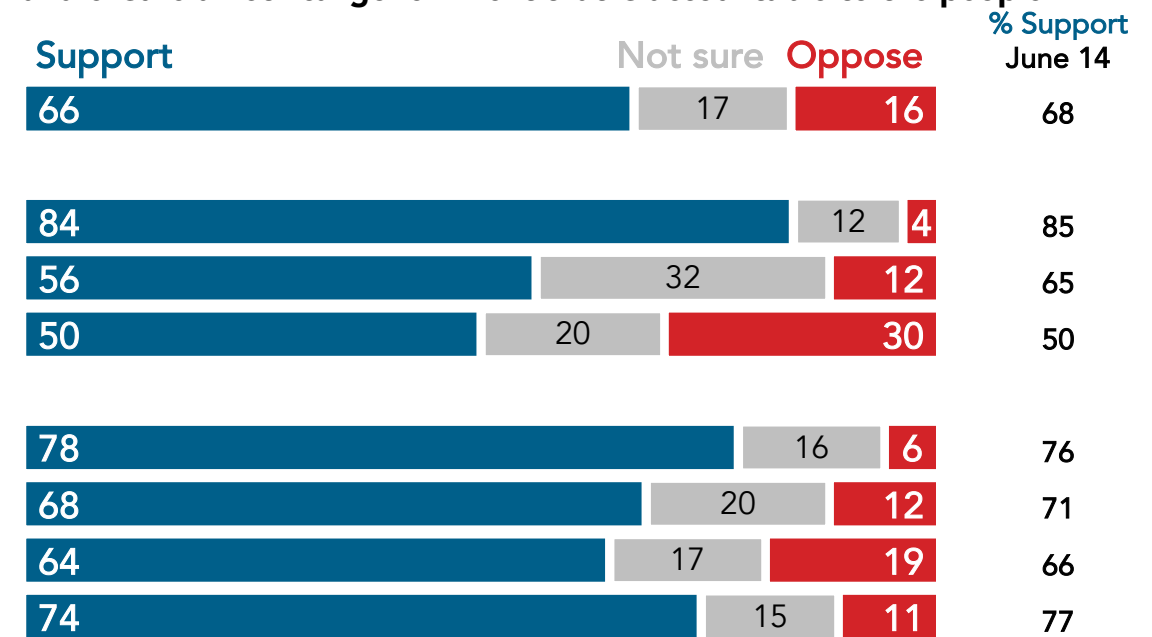
Support For the People Act Is Strong Once Informed, While Plurality Are Unsure On Initial Support

Regardless of how much you have seen or heard about the For the People Act, do you support or oppose the For the People Act?



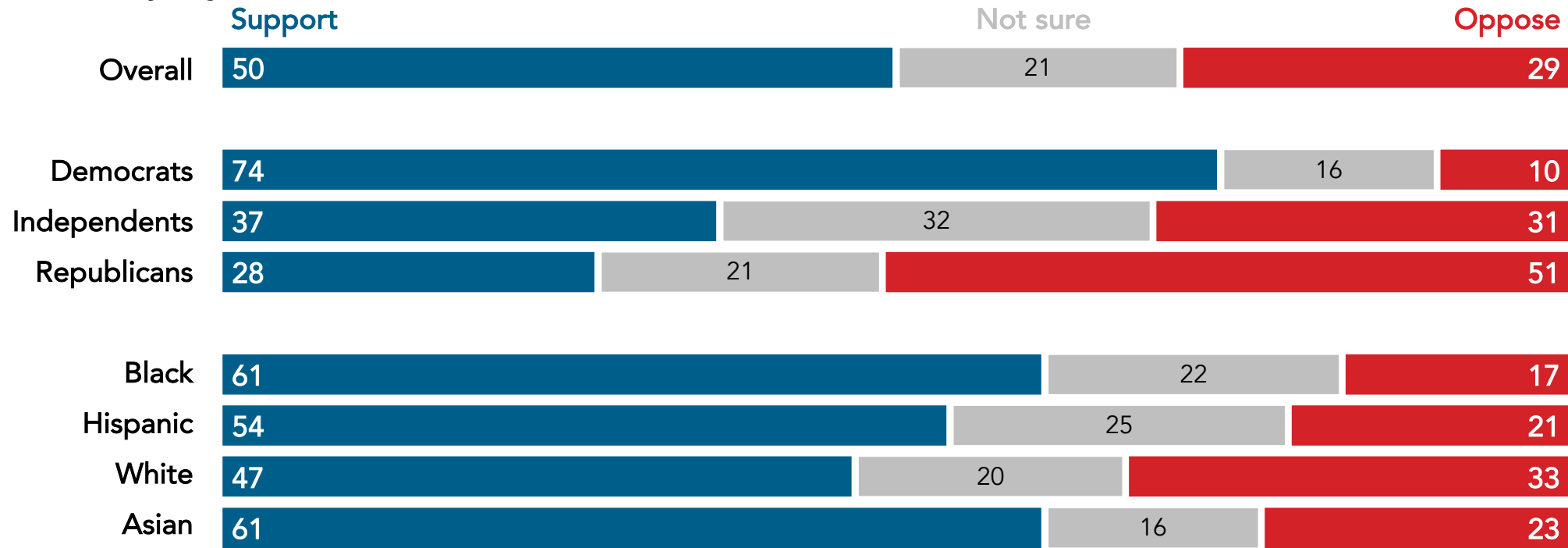

Half of Americans Support Eliminating the Filibuster To Pass the For the People Act

An additional 21% say they aren't sure, and less than three in ten Americans oppose ending the filibuster to pass it. As you may know, the Senate voted this week on the For the People Act. A majority of senators supported the Act, but it did not pass because of a Senate rule known as the filibuster, which requires 60 of the Senate's 100 senators to pass legislation instead of a majority of 51. Knowing this, do you support or oppose ending the filibuster rule so that legislation can pass the Senate with a majority of senators?
