## Few Are Hearing About the For the People Act

The share of Americans saying they are hearing "a lot" or "some" about the For the People Act is 6 points lower than it was in late June when it was blocked by Senate Republicans using the filibuster.

## Helping Protect Voting Rights and Fairer Elections Seen As Most Important Benefits of the For the People Act

In an open-ended question among those who support the For the People Act, many saw the legislation as improving the trust in the election system while taking a key step toward reducing voter suppression.
[If support the For the People Act] In a few words, how do you think legislation like the For the People Act would benefit people like you?

"[lt would] give me confidence that minorities are not being discriminated against in voting."
"Fair voting makes it possible for more people to get to the polls, resulting in the election of officials who will actually try to help the people in their districts / areas."
"I feel that the For the People Act will expand voting rights [and] change campaign finance laws to reduce the influence of money in politics."
"It keeps voting rights on a level-playing field, regardless of party and demographics."
"It helps protect my right to vote and stops the nonsense that the Republicans are trying to do to make it harder for people to vote."
"It would help create fairer elections in which anyone can run for office."
"It would ensure that everyone has the right to vote and that elections would be fairly conducted."

## Nearly Three in Five Americans Believe It Is Urgent To Pass the For the People Act Before the End of August

Majorities of independents and all racial demographics believe it is urgent to pass these reforms by the end of August.
Some argue that if these reforms are not passed by the end of August, it would make it significantly harder for some
Americans to cast their ballots in the $\mathbf{2 0 2 2}$ midterm elections and continue to allow wealthy donors and special interests to pour money into campaigns. Knowing this, how urgent do you think it is to pass these reforms by the end of August?

## About the Study

Global Strategy Group conducted public opinion surveys among a sample of 1,000 registered voters from July 29-August 2, 2021. 110 additional interviews were conducted among Hispanic voters. 79 additional interviews were conducted among Asian American and Pacific Islander voters. 105 additional interviews were conducted among African American voters. 100 additional interviews were conducted among independent voters. The survey was conducted online, recruiting respondents from an opt-in online panel vendor. Respondents were verified against a voter file and special care was taken to ensure the demographic composition of our sample matched that of the national registered voter population across a variety of demographic variables.
