

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Growing Majorities Are Hearing "A Lot" or "Some" About Biden and Democrats' New Economic Legislation

Since October 25th, there has been a 7-point increase in the share who are hearing "a lot" or "some," including a 7-point increase among Democrats (from 63% to 70%), independents (42% to 49%), and Republicans (58% to 65%).

How much have you seen, read, or heard about new economic legislation being proposed by President Biden and being negotiated by Democrats in Congress?






Support for Build Back Better Is Equally High When Policies Are Highlighted and When Pay-Fors Are Introduced

Three in five Americans support the bill with or without pay-fors. On a version of the broader support question that also included paid family and medical leave, overall support was net +31, with 54% of independents supporting it.

*As you may know, Biden and Democrats' new economic plan is expected to cost \$1.75 trillion and will establish a universal pre-K program, expand Medicare for seniors to include hearing coverage, and lower health care costs by allowing Medicare to negotiate lower drug prices. Knowing this, do you support or oppose this new economic plan?

Biden and Democrats' new economic plan would be paid for by increasing taxes on billionaires and multi-millionaires with income over \$10 million, creating a minimum 15% tax on corporate profits, adding an additional 1% tax on corporations that use profits to buy back their own stock, and cracking down on tax evasion. Knowing this, do you support or oppose this legislation?



^{*}In the most recent wave, we asked half of respondents the presented version of this question and the other half, a version that included "paid family and medical leave." 


Top Reasons to Pass Plan: Lowering Health Insurance and Prescription Drug Costs, Taxing the Rich, Expanding Medicare




When People Hear About Policies in the Plan, Belief Increases That It Will Help Personal and National Economic Situation

Net belief the plan will help the economy increases 5 points and net confidence in personal financial situations increases 6 points after exposure to policies included in the economic plan.

• Among independents, net belief it will help the economy increases 13 points and personal confidence, 8 points.




Three in Five Say Passing New Economic Plan Is Urgent

Three in five independents say passing the new plan is urgent, as do majorities across racial and ethnic groups.

• Intensity of urgency is high – especially among Democrats (58% say it is "very urgent"), Black Americans (59%), and Hispanic Americans (45%).

How urgent do you think it is that Congress passes this new economic plan?






Biden and Democrats Remain More Trusted Than Republicans on a Range of Issues Related to New Legislation

Among independents, Biden and Democrats have a 5-point trust advantage on "the cost of living for working families" and "looking out for people who work for a living," and a 2-point advantage on "rebuilding the economy."

About the Study

Global Strategy Group conducted public opinion surveys among a sample of 1,003 registered voters from November 4-November 8, 2021. 100 additional interviews were conducted among Hispanic voters. 78 additional interviews were conducted among Asian American and Pacific Islander voters. 100 additional interviews were conducted among African American voters. 100 additional interviews were conducted among independent voters. The survey was conducted online, recruiting respondents from an opt-in online panel vendor. Respondents were verified against a voter file and special care was taken to ensure the demographic composition of our sample matched that of the national registered voter population across a variety of demographic variables.
