


# Three in Four Continue to Oppose Trump Supporters' Actions on January 6<sup>th</sup> and Feel It Is Important to Prosecute Those Involved

Nearly four in five independents (77%) and three in five Republicans (61%) feel it is important to find and prosecute the January 6<sup>th</sup> rioters.






#### A Majority Support the House Investigation into January 6th

Majorities of Democrats (88%) and independents (67%) support the investigation; Republicans are more split, though more support the investigation than oppose it (+5 net support).






# Three in Four Americans Watched News About January 6<sup>th</sup> on That Day



Please indicate how concerning you find these statements that have been made about the attack on the U.S. Capitol on January 6th.



The January 6<sup>th</sup> attack on the Capitol was an event that sent a signal to elected Republican officials in Washington that <u>their supporters would stand behind any attempts</u> to undermine American democracy to hold on to power, which is now leading Republicans in state legislatures across the country to pass laws severely restricting voting rights

wealthy and big corporations, and ignore crises like the pandemic and climate change






#### Americans See January 6<sup>th</sup> as a "Riot," Though Republicans Call It a "Protest" and Democrats, a "Terrorist Attack"

#### About the Study

Global Strategy Group conducted public opinion surveys among samples of 1,000 registered voters from November 18-November 22, 2021 and December 3-6, 2021. Additional interviews were conducted among approximately 100 Hispanic voters per survey, approximately 70 Asian American and Pacific Islander voters per survey, approximately 100 African American voters per survey, and approximately 100 independent voters per survey. Both surveys were conducted online, recruiting respondents from an opt-in online panel vendor. Respondents were verified against a voter file and special care was taken to ensure the demographic composition of our sample matched that of the national registered voter population across a variety of demographic variables.

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
