The Inflation Reduction Act: A Guide for Advocates


- Following the Inflation Reduction Act's passage, it has support from two in three Americans.

- Americans say the plan bringing down costs and showing Congress can get something done are the best descriptors, and messaging on the plan moves a majority to say Democrats are focused on the right things and to trust Biden and Democrats over Republicans on a range of economic issues.



The Inflation Reduction Act Earns Support From Two in Three Americans

Nearly two in three independents (64%) and almost two in five Republicans support the plan (35%).

As you may know, Biden and Democrats' new legislation that has been passed by Congress is called the Inflation Reduction Act, which will give Medicare the power to negotiate lower drug prices, bring down health insurance premiums, and invest in clean energy like wind and solar power. Knowing this, do you support or oppose this new economic plan?






The Share Hearing About the Inflation Reduction Act Has Increased by Double Digits in the Last Two Weeks

However, while 63% of Americans are hearing "a lot" or "some" about the Inflation Reduction Act, the share is much lower among independents (47%) and economically persuadable Americans* (49%).



Three in Five Americans Are More Motivated to Vote Due to the Passage of the Inflation Reduction Act

Democrats are most likely to say that passage of the legislation would make them "more motivated to vote" (64% more motivated). Nearly two in three Black Americans also say it makes them more motivated to vote (63%).

Policies to Bring Down Health Costs – Including Insurance and Drug Prices – Are Most Supported in Inflation Reduction Act

Among independents and Republicans, popular elements include capping insulin costs (77% and 74% support) and out-of-pocket costs (85% and 68%), Medicare negotiating for drug prices (79% and 69%), and tax incentives for domestic manufacturing jobs (76% and 68%).



Lowering Prices Of Prescription Drugs And Other Health Care Costs Seen As Both Most Positive And Believable Impacts

We asked half of respondents to rate how positive of an impact each outcome will have on themselves and their communities and half to rate how believable each outcome is. Bringing down healthcare and prescription drug costs are seen as having highly positive impacts and are viewed as believable. But, while bringing down energy costs is rated as a top two policy in terms of personal positive impact, it is one of the least believable outcomes for Americans.





Cost Lowering and Congress Getting Something Done Are Seen as Best Outcomes of the Inflation Reduction Act

Two in five Democrats (41%) say "it lowers costs," as do 35% of independents, 23% of Republicans, and 39% of Black Americans.









Assurance Nobody Earning Under \$400,000 Will Pay More in Taxes Does Not Impact Support for Inflation Reduction Act


Three in five Americans support the Inflation Reduction Act when policies that will help pay for the plan are explained, regardless of whether the statement includes the caveat that nobody earning less than \$400,000 a year will pay more in taxes (63% versus 60%).

Statements from Supporters About Lowering Drug Prices are More Convincing than Opponents' Latest Messaging

Progressive statements are more convincing than conservative attacks about the Inflation Reduction Act suggesting it cuts Medicare.

Statement 1: Opponents of the Inflation Reduction Act who say the plan cuts Medicare by nearly \$300 billion in order to fund other liberal priorities like Obamacare and the Green New Deal.

Statement 2: Supporters of the Inflation Reduction Act who say that independent fact checkers confirm the plan doesn't cut Medicare, but gives Medicare the power to negotiate lower prescription drug prices so it will save the government and taxpayers nearly \$300 billion from Medicare.

Statement 3: Supporters who say the Inflation Reduction Act strengthens Medicare by giving it the power to negotiate lower prices for prescription drugs, which will save patients billions while preventing drug companies from outrageous annual price increases.



Inflation Reduction Act Messaging Drives Up the Share Who Say Democrats are Focused on the Right Things

Messaging on the policies and outcomes from the Inflation Reduction Act moves Hispanic Americans to say the Democratic Party is focused on the right things by 24 points, white Americans by 18 points, and independents by 16 points.

Biden and Democrats Are More Trusted on a Range of Economic Items After Inflation Reduction Act Messaging

While Biden and Democrats are initially less trusted on rebuilding the economy (net -5 Biden and Democrats) and inflation (net -5), they lead Republicans by 1 point on inflation after Inflation Reduction Act messaging and tie Republicans on rebuilding the economy.




Americans Rate Climate as a Top Three Issue and Increasingly Trust Biden and Democrats to Handle It


Since late July, there has been a 9-point increase in the share who say climate change and the environment should be a top issue for President Biden and Congress to focus on and an 8-point increase in net trust in Biden and Democrats to address climate change.

Trust in Biden and Democrats to address climate change among independents has increased a net 10 points since July (+23 to +33).

Navigator is designed to act as a consistent, flexible, responsive tool to inform policy debates by conducting research and reliable guidance to inform allies, elected leaders, and the press. About the Study

Global Strategy Group conducted public opinion surveys among a sample of 1,000 registered voters from August 11-August 14, 2022. 106 additional interviews were conducted among Hispanic voters. 78 additional interviews were conducted among Asian American and Pacific Islander voters. 102 additional interviews were conducted among independent voters. The survey was conducted online, recruiting respondents from an opt-in online panel vendor. Respondents were verified against a voter file and special care was taken to ensure the demographic composition of our sample matched that of the national registered voter population across a variety of demographic variables.

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
