Strikes: A Guide for Advocates
*Note: This survey was fielded before the agreement was reached between the Writers Guild of America and the Alliance of Motion Picture and Television Producers.

## Key Takeaways:

- The United Auto Workers and Writers Guild of America are both viewed more favorably than unfavorably, as just over half of Americans report hearing about both strikes.
- Fully four in five Americans support employees' right to bargain collectively and to strike to negotiate for better workplace conditions such as pay, health care, and time off.
- More than three in four support the employees who are on strike in both cases over their employers.
- Roughly half of Americans say the Democratic Party and Joe Biden are more supportive of labor unions than Republicans and Donald Trump, respectively; nearly three in five say Trump has always looked out for big corporations and rich people like himself instead of American workers.


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## The UAW and WGA Are Both Viewed More Favorably Than Unfavorably

A majority of Americans ( $51 \%$ ) view the United Auto Workers favorably - including a majority of Democrats (net +51 favorable) and pluralities of independents (net +22) and Republicans (net +14).

## Just Over Half Are Hearing About the UAW Strike and the WGA Strike

Democrats (54\% hearing "a lot" or "some") and Republicans (53\%) are hearing roughly equal amounts about employees in the United Auto Workers union going on strike, while Democrats ( $61 \%$ ) are hearing more about the Writers Guild of America strike than Republicans (49\%) or independents (47\%).

## Four in Five Support Collective Bargaining and the Right to Strike

Large majorities across party lines support employees' right to bargain collectively (net +83 support among Democrats, net +59 among both independents and Republicans) and employees' right to go on strike (net $+85,+63$, and +55 , respectively), as overwhelming majorities across racial lines also support each.

Clear majorities of Democrats (net +60 corporate greed), independents (net +20 ), and Americans across racial lines agree more that "corporate greed is hurting these employees" than that "the push for electric vehicles" is.

## Majorities Say Biden and Democrats Each Are More Supportive of Labor Unions

A majority of Americans say Democrats are more supportive of labor unions (53\%), compared to only $15 \%$ who say the same of the GOP; nearly half also say Biden is more supportive of labor unions (49\%), compared to fewer than one in five who say the same of Trump (18\%).

## Trump Is Seen as Looking Out for Big Corporations and the Rich, Not Workers Like UAW Strikers

Nearly three in five independents (57\%) and majorities of Americans across racial lines agree more that "Donald Trump does not look out for American workers" than that he "is on the side of workers."

## About the Study

Global Strategy Group conducted public opinion surveys among a sample of 1,000 registered voters from September 21-September 25, 2023. 105 additional interviews were conducted among Hispanic voters. 75 additional interviews were conducted among Asian American and Pacific Islander voters. 104 additional interviews were conducted among African American voters. 102 additional interviews were conducted among independent voters. The survey was conducted online, recruiting respondents from an opt-in online panel vendor. Respondents were verified against a voter file and special care was taken to ensure the demographic composition of our sample matched that of the national registered voter population across a variety of demographic variables.

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
