## Methodology


$100 \%$ of interviews were conducted by text-to-web.

Interviews were conducted between October 19-25, 2023. Trended results from the July and April surveys are from interviews conducted between July 6-12, 2023 and April 20-27, 2023, respectively.

The margin of error for a sample of this size is +/- 2.5 percentage points at the $95 \%$ level of confidence. The margin of error for subgroups varies and is higher.

## Key Takeaways

- Voters in the battleground overwhelming support a woman's right to choose. 64 percent of voters think abortion should be legal in all or some circumstances, compared to 6 percent who think it should be completely illegal.
- Democrats are far more trusted on abortion than Republicans. By more than a two-to-one margin, battleground voters trust Democrats more than Republicans on abortion, including among independents by a 28 -point margin.
- Battleground voters oppose Roe v. Wade being overturned and want Congress to re-establish protections nationwide. A majority of voters oppose overturning Roe $v$. Wade and nearly 60 percent support a law that would protection abortion nationwide, including 47 percent who would strongly support such a law.
- Voters view Republicans as too extreme on abortion and worry they will try to pass further restrictions. Over half of battleground voters think the Republican Party is too extreme on abortion, and nearly two-thirds think Republicans will pass more restrictions on abortion.

#### Abstract

About the Study Impact Research conducted public opinion surveys among a sample of 1,500 likely 2024 general election voters from October 19-25, 2023. The survey was conducted by text-to-web ( 100 percent). Respondents were verified against a voter file and special care was taken to ensure the demographic composition of our sample matched that of the 61 congressional districts included in the sample across a variety of demographic variables. The margin of error for the full sample at the 95 percent level of confidence is $+/-2.5$ percentage points. The margin for error for subgroups varies and is higher.
