
- By a two-to-one margin, most Americans say the overturning of *Roe v. Wade* has been bad for the country, as most Americans remain favorable toward *Roe*.

- A majority of Americans support early medication abortion care remaining legal, with many holding positive views of abortion medication though very few are familiar with Mifepristone by name.
- Far more Americans think Republicans in Congress are focused on abortion than think the same of Donald Trump.



More Than Three in Five Americans Are Pro-Choice, While Only One In Five Say Abortion Is Wrong and Should Be Illegal

The 14% of Americans who say they are "anti-abortion" or who are unsure, but also say abortion is either morally acceptable and should be legal or are personally against abortion but do not think the government should ban it, tend to be: not very conservative Republicans (21% are in this mixed abortion view group), Republican women (20%), moms (19%), and Catholics (18%).








Almost Three in Five Say Roe Being Overturned Has Been Bad for the Country

More than three in five independents (62%), as well as majorities across racial lines, say the Supreme Court's decision has been bad for the country.






Majorities Continue to View Roe v. Wade Favorably

Nearly half of independents view *Roe v. Wade* favorably, with net favorability ratings among them higher now than in April of last year (+11) or of 2022 (+24) before it was overturned by the Supreme Court.

Please indicate how favorable or unfavorable you are to: Roe v. Wade.






Three in Five Support a Federal Law Guaranteeing the Right to an Abortion, and an Even Greater Share Oppose a National Ban


Majorities of independents oppose a nationwide ban on abortion (68% oppose) and support Congress passing a law that would guarantee the right to an abortion (58% support).

• The 61% who support Congress passing a law guaranteeing the right to an abortion is the highest share in Navigator's tracking.

Do you support or oppose Congress passing a law guaranteeing the right to an abortion?








Americans Are Not Familiar With Mifepristone By Name, But View Abortion Medication Favorably

More than four in five Americans (83%) are unfamiliar with Mifepristone by name, but Americans view "abortion medication" favorably by a net 17-point margin, with just 19% who say they do not know enough to say.





Most Support Early Medication Abortion Care Remaining Legal

A majority of independents (net +34 legal), as well as majorities across racial lines, say Mifepristone should remain legal.

• Republicans are split on the issue, with one in three saying it should remain legal (33%), slightly more saying it should be illegal (37%), and three in ten saying they are not sure (30%).


Do you think early medication abortion care, known as Mifepristone, should remain legal or be made illegal?





Americans Say Republicans in Congress Are More Focused on Abortion Than Trump Is

One in three Americans say Republicans in Congress are focused on abortion as a top four issue (32%), while just 12% say the same of Trump. Among Republicans, 19% say it is a top four issue for Republicans in Congress, while just 6% say the same of Trump.






Three in Five Are Concerned Trump Said There Has to Be Punishment For Women Who Have Abortions

Majorities of Americans are concerned by Trump's suggestion that women who have abortions should be punished, including two in three women (66%). However, more than one in four Americans do not believe Trump said this (27%), including 42% of not very conservative Republicans and 59% of very conservative Republicans.






Almost Two in Five Report Knowing Someone Who Has Had an Abortion

Women (45% know someone) are among the likeliest to know someone close to them who has had an abortion. Two in five Democrats (43%), 44% of pro-choice Americans, and 45% of Black Americans also report knowing someone who has had one; one in three independents (34%) and Republicans (31%) also report knowing someone who has had an abortion.

About the Study

Global Strategy Group conducted public opinion surveys among a sample of 1,000 registered voters from January 4-January 8, 2024. 100 additional interviews were conducted among Hispanic voters. 75 additional interviews were conducted among Asian American and Pacific Islander voters. 100 additional interviews were conducted among African American voters. 100 additional interviews were conducted among independent voters. The survey was conducted online, recruiting respondents from an opt-in online panel vendor. Respondents were verified against a voter file and special care was taken to ensure the demographic composition of our sample matched that of the national registered voter population across a variety of demographic variables.
