Perceptions of Democratic Lawmakers





Methodology

Impact Research conducted a survey of N=1500 likely 2024 general election voters in 61 battleground congressional districts.

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100% of interviews were conducted by text-to-web.



Interviews were conducted between January 11-15, 2024. Trended results from the October, July and April surveys are from interviews conducted between October 19-25, 2023, July 6-12, 2023 and April 20-27, 2023, respectively.



The margin of error for a sample of this size is +/- 2.5 percentage points at the 95% level of confidence. The margin of error for subgroups varies and is higher.






- Named Democratic lawmakers are viewed net favorably by constituents in their districts. Democratic lawmakers are net 7 points above water, consistent with our past battleground surveys.
- Democratic lawmakers are most trusted by their constituents on protecting abortion rights, protecting democracy, and making health care more affordable. Half of constituents also trust their Democratic lawmakers to support the right policies in Congress.
- Two in three districts represented by Democratic lawmakers think Democrats in Congress are most likely to protect abortion rights. Nearly half think Democrats in Congress think they are likely to push for a fairer tax system, target corporations that price gouge, and bring down energy costs.

About the Study

Impact Research conducted public opinion surveys among a sample of 1,500 likely 2024 general election voters from January 11-15, 2024. The survey was conducted by text-to-web (100 percent). Respondents were verified against a voter file and special care was taken to ensure the demographic composition of our sample matched that of the 61 congressional districts included in the sample across a variety of demographic variables. The margin of error for the full sample at the 95 percent level of confidence is +/- 2.5 percentage points. The margin for error for subgroups varies and is higher.
