- Americans trust Biden and Democrats more than Republicans on health care.

"Banning" Medicare from Lowering Prescription Drug Prices Generates More Opposition Than "Repealing Legislation"


While just under three in five Americans (57%) oppose "repealing legislation that allows Medicare to negotiate for lower prescription drug prices," nearly four in five (77%) oppose "banning Medicare from negotiating lower prices for prescription drugs."

Both the ACA and Obamacare Are Broadly Popular, With More Positive Views of ACA; Both Have Improved Since 2020

A majority of independents (55% favorable) and more than one in three Republicans (37%) view the Affordable Care Act favorably.

• Since 2020, ratings of the ACA have improved by a net 14 points (from net +23 to net +37 favorable), and ratings of Obamacare have improved by a net 10 points (from net +5 to net +15).



About the Study

Global Strategy Group conducted public opinion surveys among a sample of 1,000 registered voters from January 25-January 29, 2024. 100 additional interviews were conducted among Hispanic voters. 75 additional interviews were conducted among Asian American and Pacific Islander voters. 100 additional interviews were conducted among African American voters. 100 additional interviews were conducted among independent voters. The survey was conducted online, recruiting respondents from an opt-in online panel vendor. Respondents were verified against a voter file and special care was taken to ensure the demographic composition of our sample matched that of the national registered voter population across a variety of demographic variables.
