



Tax Fairness: A Guide for Advocates





Key Takeaways:

- Nearly four in five Americans including large majorities across partisan and racial lines support raising taxes on the wealthy and big corporations.
- The most concerning parts of Republican tax positions are giving tax breaks to wealthy people and big corporations, while making the middle class pay more or cutting programs people depend on like Social Security and Medicare.
- The most convincing pieces of Democrats' tax positions are cracking down on wealthy tax cheats and closing tax loopholes.

Four in Five Support Raising Taxes on the Rich and Big Corporations

Large majorities across party and racial lines support raising taxes on the wealthy and big corporations, including more than three in four independents (net +63 support) and more than three in five Republicans (net +33).

Biden and the Democratic Party More Trusted on Tax Fairness; Republicans More Trusted to Handle Cost of Living

Democrats hold an advantage on "making the tax system more fair" among independents (net +5 trust Biden and Democrats more), as well as large advantages among Black (net +44) and Hispanic (net +18) Americans. However, Republicans are more trusted to handle "the cost of living" among independents by 14 points.


Exposure to Republicans' Positions on Taxes Drives Up Trust in Biden & Democrats Most

Exposure to Republicans' tax positions shifts net trust toward Biden and Democrats by 13 points (from net +5 trust Biden and Democrats to net +18) while exposure to Democrats' tax positions only shifts net trust by 2 points (from net +6 to net +8).


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Learning Where the Parties Stand on Taxes Improves Progressive Policy Makers' Standing on Tax Fairness & the Cost of Living

After exposure to where the parties stand on taxes, Biden and Democrats are more trusted on "making the tax system more fair" by 13 points (up from net +6 trust Biden and Democrats) and are more trusted on "the cost of living" by 9 (up from net -4 trust).

About the Study

Global Strategy Group conducted public opinion surveys among a sample of 1,000 registered voters from February 15-February 19, 2024. 100 additional interviews were conducted among Hispanic voters. 75 additional interviews were conducted among Asian American and Pacific Islander voters. 100 additional interviews were conducted among African American voters. 100 additional interviews were conducted among independent voters. The survey was conducted online, recruiting respondents from an opt-in online panel vendor. Respondents were verified against a voter file and special care was taken to ensure the demographic composition of our sample matched that of the national registered voter population across a variety of demographic variables.
