## Trust in the Supreme Court Has Rebounded Slightly, But a Plurality Still Say It Is Taking Away Freedoms

Growing trust in the Supreme Court to make the right decisions in the future is driven by Republicans (net +54 trust), while majorities of Democrats ( $61 \%$ don't trust) and independents (57\%) don't trust the Supreme Court.

## Nearly Four in Five Prefer the Government Stay Out of Abortion Decisions

Large majorities of Democrats (90\%), independents (76\%), and Republicans (63\%) say either that abortion is "morally acceptable and should be legal" or that they are personally against it but "don't believe government should prevent a person from making that decision for themselves."

## Early Abortion Medication Is Popular While Mifepristone is Largely Unknown

A clear majority of Democrats (74\%), a plurality of independents (47\%), and nearly one in three Republicans (30\%) hold favorable views of "early abortion medication," while nearly three in four Americans are unfamiliar with Mifepristone (72\%).

## A Growing Majority Want Early Medication Abortion Care to Remain Legal

Growing shares of Democrats (net +74 legal now, compared to net +67 in January), independents (net +42 vs. net +34 ), and Republicans (net +6 vs. net -4 ) say early medication abortion care should remain legal.

## Americans Support Congress Taking Action to Protect Prescription Abortion Medication

Majorities of Democrats (net +73 support) and independents (net +28 ) and majorities across racial lines support a national law to protect access to prescription abortion medication.

## The FDA Is Popular, Though Americans Unvaccinated Against Coronavirus Are Split in Their Views

In addition to large majorities of Democrats (74\%) and Americans across racial lines, a majority of Republicans also say they view the FDA favorably (53\%), as do a plurality of independents (46\%).

#### Abstract

About the Study Global Strategy Group conducted public opinion surveys among a sample of 1,000 registered voters from March 28-March 31, 2024. 100 additional interviews were conducted among Hispanic voters. 75 additional interviews were conducted among Asian American and Pacific Islander voters. 100 additional interviews were conducted among African American voters. 100 additional interviews were conducted among independent voters. The survey was conducted online, recruiting respondents from an opt-in online panel vendor. Respondents were verified against a voter file and special care was taken to ensure the demographic composition of our sample matched that of the national registered voter population across a variety of demographic variables.
