Methodology



Impact Research conducted a survey of N=1600 likely 2024 general election voters in 61 battleground congressional districts.



100% of interviews were conducted by text-to-web.



Interviews were conducted between May 30-June 4, 2024.



The margin of error for a sample of this size is +/- 2.5 percentage points at the 95% level of confidence. The margin of error for subgroups varies and is higher.



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
Key Takeaways

- Battleground constituents overwhelming support Congress protecting access to contraception and reestablishing nationwide abortion protections. More than half "strongly" support Congress putting protections in place for contraception and half "strongly" support nationwide access to abortion.
- A majority think Republicans in Congress will impose further restrictions on abortion if they have full control of Congress. Three in five constituents including a third of Republicans think congressional Republicans will further restrict access to abortions if they have control of Congress. Among those who do not think Republicans will impose further restrictions, nearly a quarter think they will try and fail or aren't sure what Republicans will do.


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Most Constituents Support Protecting Abortion at the National Level, Including Half Who "Strongly" Support It

Do you support or oppose Congress passing a law that would re-establish a nationwide right to access abortion in the U.S. and protect physicians who provide abortions?



If Republicans win the next election, do you think they will pass more restrictions on abortion nationwide?



About the Study

Impact Research conducted public opinion surveys among a sample of 1,600 likely 2024 general election voters from May 30-June 4, 2024. The survey was conducted by text-to-web (100 percent). Respondents were verified against a voter file and special care was taken to ensure the demographic composition of our sample matched that of the 61 congressional districts included in the sample across a variety of demographic variables. The margin of error for the full sample at the 95 percent level of confidence is +/- 2.5 percentage points. The margin for error for subgroups varies and is higher.
