The Political Landscape in the Battleground





Methodology



Impact Research conducted a survey of N=1600 likely 2024 general election voters in 61 battleground congressional districts.



100% of interviews were conducted by text-to-web.



Interviews were conducted between May 30-June 4, 2024.



The margin of error for a sample of this size is +/- 2.5 percentage points at the 95% level of confidence. The margin of error for subgroups varies and is higher.



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
Key Takeaways

- While both parties have net negative favorability ratings, named Democratic lawmakers have net positive ratings while named Republican lawmakers have net negative ratings. Democratic lawmakers also have comparative advantages to Republican lawmakers on overall job ratings and handling the economy.
- Named Democratic lawmakers are also more trusted on all issues more than Republican lawmakers. This includes double-digit trust advantages on issues like protecting abortion rights, protecting democracy, making health care and prescription drugs more affordable protecting consumers, and looking out for the middle class.
- Two in three battleground constituents continue to believe Republicans in Congress are prioritizing the wrong things. Seven in ten also think they are focused more on non-economic issues and a majority believe their economic policies benefit the wealthy and corporations most.

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



How would you rate the job [NAMED REPUBLICAN LAWMAKER] is doing as a member of Congress?







Most Constituents Continue to Believe Republicans Are Prioritizing the Wrong Things in Congress Since Taking Control



Which of the following comes closer to your view? Since taking control, Republicans in Congress have:



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

About the Study

Impact Research conducted public opinion surveys among a sample of 1,600 likely 2024 general election voters from May 30-June 4, 2024. The survey was conducted by text-to-web (100 percent). Respondents were verified against a voter file and special care was taken to ensure the demographic composition of our sample matched that of the 61 congressional districts included in the sample across a variety of demographic variables. The margin of error for the full sample at the 95 percent level of confidence is +/- 2.5 percentage points. The margin of error for subgroups varies and is higher.
