


### **Growing Shares Continue to View Project 2025 Negatively**

Nearly half of Americans now view Project 2025 unfavorably, including almost seven in ten Democrats (69%) and 42% of independents.

Among non-MAGA Republicans\*, the plan remains underwater by 18 points.




## More Americans Continue to Report Familiarity With Project 2025

When the proposal is briefly described, now nearly half of Americans report hearing "a lot" or "some" about it, including 63% of Democrats and 45% of independents.

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


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### A Plurality Continue to Oppose Project 2025

#### Do you support or oppose Project 2025?



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
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# Similar Shares Tie Both Trump and Republicans in Congress to Project 2025; the Share Who Tie It to Trump Has Grown

A majority of Americans think Project 2025 accurately describes what Trump stands for (51%), and nearly as many say it accurately describes what Republicans in Congress stand for (46%).

• There has been a 6-point net increase in the share who say it describes what Trump stands for since mid-July (from +29 to +35).



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# Most Concerning Project 2025 Policies: Unchecked Presidential Power, Abortion Bans, ACA Repeal

Unchecked presidential power is concerning across partisanship, with Democrats also concerned about abortion bans and independents, non-MAGA Republicans\*, and MAGA Republicans\* concerned about loss of coverage for people with pre-existing conditions.


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### A Growing Majority – Now Three in Four – of Americans Say Trump Believes Abortion Should Be Illegal in All or Most Cases

Since September of last year, there has been a 19-point net increase in the share who say Trump believes abortion should be illegal in all or most cases (from net-41 legal to net -60), including a 22-point net increase among independents (from net -31 to net -53).

Navigator is designed to act as a consistent, flexible, responsive tool to inform policy debates by conducting research and reliable guidance to inform allies, elected leaders, and the press. Navigator is a project led by pollsters from Global Strategy Group and GBAO along with an advisory committee, including: Jessica Floyd, The Hub Project; Christina Reynolds, EMILY's List; Mike Podhorzer, AFL-CIO; Jesse Ferguson, progressive strategist; Navin Nayak, Center for American Progress Action Fund; Stephanie Valencia, EquisLabs; and Melanie Newman, Planned Parenthood Action Fund.

#### About the Study

Global Strategy Group conducted a public opinion survey among a sample of 1,000 registered voters from August 1-August 4, 2024. 100 additional interviews were conducted among Hispanic voters. 75 additional interviews were conducted among Asian American and Pacific Islander voters. 100 additional interviews were conducted among independent voters. 200 additional interviews were conducted among voters ages 18-34. The survey was conducted online, recruiting respondents from an opt-in online panel vendor. Respondents were verified against a voter file and special care was taken to ensure the demographic composition of our sample matched that of the national registered voter population across a variety of demographic variables. The margin of error for the full sample at the 95 percent level of confidence is +/- 3.1 percentage points. The margin for error for subgroups varies and is higher.

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
