Changing Views of Lawmakers in the Battleground





Methodology



Impact Research conducted seven surveys of N=1,500 likely 2024 general election voters in 61 battleground congressional districts.



The first wave of interviews was conducted in April 2023, and the seventh wave of interviews was conducted in August 2024.



The margin of error for each survey sample is +/- 2.5 percentage points at the 95% level of confidence. The margin of error for subgroups varies and is higher.




Key Takeaways

- Democratic lawmakers are outperforming their Republican colleagues on various important metrics. Democrats are more popular personally, have a better job rating, and a better job rating on the economy than Republican incumbents.
- Battleground constituents trust Democratic lawmakers more than Republicans on key issues. Democrats hold an advantage on important issues like protecting abortion rights, making health care and prescription drugs more affordable, and ensuring that the wealthy pay their fair share in taxes.




Since April of Last Year, Democratic Lawmakers Have Consistently Outpaced Their Republican Colleagues' Popularity






The Gap Between Democratic and Republican Lawmakers' Net Job Rating Has Been Around Double Digits Starting in April 2023







About the Study

Impact Research conducted public opinion surveys among a sample of 1,500 likely 2024 general election voters from August 7 - 12, 2024. The survey was conducted by text-to-web (100 percent). Respondents were verified against a voter file and special care was taken to ensure the demographic composition of our sample matched that of the 61 congressional districts included in the sample across a variety of demographic variables. The margin of error for the full sample at the 95 percent level of confidence is +/- 2.5 percentage points. The margin for error for subgroups varies and is higher.
