2024 Voters Survey: Ideological Debates of the Election



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What We Did

The slides in this presentation are based on interviews with 5,000 registered voters who had already voted or planned to vote in the November election, with interviews conducted October 31st to November 9th, 2024.

Support for Kamala Harris and Donald Trump in the presidential election, Democrats and Republicans in Senate elections, and Democrats and Republicans in House elections have been adjusted to reflect the actual expected votes as of November 9th. The analysis aims to provide a tool for Americans to understand what happened in the 2024 election, why it happened, and what's next.




Key Takeaways:

- Inflation, immigration, and the economy were most important to voters in 2024, with abortion as a top issue for Harris' base. Voters said that the economy was more important than both abortion and immigration in head-to-head comparisons.
- Trump won among voters who prioritized inflation, immigration, and the economy.
- 2024 voters were more likely to agree with progressive positions than conservative ones on many issues, including health care, housing, energy, inflation, gun violence prevention, and elections.
- Voters were strongly pro-choice, agreed with progressive arguments around abortion both legally and from a values perspective, and said they would have voted to protect abortion rights.



Inflation Was the Top Issue in the Campaign, Especially With Swing Voters; For Harris Voters, Abortion Rose to the Top

Nearly half of swing voters*** (45%) and a majority of new Trump voters* (55%) said inflation was one of their top three issues.







Voters Who Prioritized Inflation, Immigration, Economy Backed Trump; Abortion, Democracy, and Health Care Backed Harris

Among those who prioritized the top three issues – inflation, immigration, and the economy – Trump won decisively. In the election for President, who did you vote for?



Voters Report Voting Against Candidates for Their Positions on Abortion, Inflation, and Immigration – More Than Other Issues



Voters Saw Inflation As the Dominant Issue, Even Over Other Top Issues Including Abortion and Immigration

Far more voters said the economy and inflation was more important to their vote than either abortion (69% vs. 31%) or immigration (74% vs. 26%). Swing voters chose the economy over abortion and immigration each by 58 points.

• Only base Harris voters chose abortion over the economy, and they did so only by 6 points.

Swing Voters Sided Decisively With Democrats on Abortion

On both a values-based abortion argument and a more legally focused one, swing voters sided with Democrats (net +34 agreed with progressive view on abortion values, net +20 on a legal abortion argument).

Which statement do you agree with more, even if neither fully represents your view?



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


2024 Voters Were More in Favor of Abortion Being Legal in All Or Most Circumstances Than 2020 Voters

More than three in five 2024 voters said they thought abortion should be legal in all or most cases (62%), compared to 55% of 2020 voters.

About the Study

Global Strategy Group conducted an online survey of 5,000 registered voters from October 31st through November 9th, 2024, with respondents recruited from opt-in online panel vendors. Of that 5,000, 4,784 respondents were verified against a voter file (and the other 216 were voters who said they were registering before voting if interviewed before Election Day) and special care was taken to ensure the demographic composition of the sample reflected that of the expected 2024 electorate. The vote shares for Kamala Harris, Donald Trump, House and Senate Democrats, and House and Senate Republicans were also adjusted to reflect a preliminary estimate of the vote in the 2024 election. The margin of error for the full sample at the 95 percent level of confidence is +/- 1.4 percentage points. The margin of error for subgroups varies and is higher.
