

# Methodology





### Key Takeaways

- Inflation and the cost of living was the top vote driver in the 2024 election. More than two in three voters said it mattered a great deal in how they voted.
- Voters had a better sense of where Republicans stood on inflation than Democrats. More than a quarter of voters said they heard a lot about Republicans' stance on cost of living, while just 16 percent said the same about Democratic candidates.
- Voters thought Democrats would do more than Republicans to hurt the economy and increase costs. By a 4-point margin, voters sided with Republicans on both metrics, while they trusted Democrats more to lower health care costs and prescription drug costs.



## Inflation and Taxes Were Most Important to Republican Voters; Social Security Was More of a Priority for Democratic Voters



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#### Nearly Nine in Ten Late Deciders Said Inflation Was at Least Some Factor in How They Voted


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# Voters Heard Most About Democrats' Position on Fair Taxes; Just Just Two in Five Heard Anything About the Cost of Living



In a world where the news cycle is the length of a tweet, our leaders often lack the real-time public-sentiment analysis to shape the best approaches to talking about the issues that matter the most. **Navigator** is designed to act as a consistent, flexible, responsive tool to inform policy debates by conducting research and reliable guidance to inform allies, elected leaders, and the press. **Navigating the Battleground** is a project designed to understand messaging nuances in different types of battleground geographies, led by pollsters from Impact Research along with an advisory committee, including: Jessica Floyd, The Hub Project; Christina Reynolds, EMILY's List; Mike Podhorzer, AFL-CIO; Jesse Ferguson, progressive strategist; Navin Nayak, Center for American Progress Action Fund; Stephanie Valencia, EquisLabs; and Melanie Newman, Planned Parenthood Action Fund.

#### About the Study

Impact Research conducted public opinion surveys among a sample of 1,500 likely 2024 general election voters from November 2 - 6, 2024. The survey was conducted by text-to-web (100 percent). Respondents were verified against a voter file and special care was taken to ensure the demographic composition of our sample matched that of the 61 congressional districts included in the sample across a variety of demographic variables. The margin of error for the full sample at the 95 percent level of confidence is +/- 2.5 percentage points. The margin for error for subgroups varies and is higher.
