
- President-elect Trump's favorability rating has reached the highest point in Navigator tracking since 2020, and half of Americans approve of his handling of the presidential transition. Still, Americans report hearing more negative than positive news on him, with negative recall centering on his sentencing and comments about Greenland, Canada, and the Panama Canal.
- Pluralities believe the economy and immigration will get better under Trump, while political division and abortion access are expected to get worse.
- Americans are more likely to say broad economic metrics will improve under Trump than that their personal costs on things like groceries or health care will go down.



Approval of Trump's Presidential Transition Is Above Water

Half of Americans approve of Trump's handling of the transition (50% approve), driven largely by Republicans (89% approve).

Do you approve or disapprove of the way Donald Trump is handling the presidential transition?






Trump Is Currently Enjoying a Popularity High Point in Navigator Tracking Since 2020

Trump's favorability rating of 48% is the highest point in Navigator tracking since 2020, though he remains underwater by 2 points.

• In Navigator tracking, Biden's ratings were higher than Trump's recent ratings both before and after the 2020 election (52% favorable/45% unfavorable in December 2020 and in late October 2020, pre-election), though he did not see a bump in his favorability ratings after the 2020 election like Trump has since November.

Republicans Stand Alone in Their Positive Views of Elon Musk, While Independents and Democrats Have Grown More Negative

There is a wide partisan divide in views of Musk, with Republicans holding an overwhelmingly positive view (net +54 favorable) while Democrats view him deeply unfavorably (net -62).




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
Americans Want a Focus on Inflation, the Economy; See Trump and Republicans As Most Focused on Immigration

While immigration is a top issue for one in three (36% top five), seven in ten say it is a top focus for Trump and Republicans (71%). More Americans want a focus on inflation, Social Security and Medicare, and health care than say Trump and Republicans are focused on them.

Which do you think Donald Trump and Republicans in Congress are most focused on?






Americans Are Hearing More Negative Than Positive On Trump, With a Focus On His Recent Sentencing and Greenland

Roughly two in three Americans (65%) report hearing mostly negative/a mix of positive and negative news about Trump recently, while closer to half report hearing positive/a mix (53%); independents are more likely to report hearing negative news (73%) than positive (46%).



Do you think the government under Trump will represent you and people like you better, worse, or will there be no difference compared to now?






Most Likely Trump Economic Outcomes: Lower Taxes for the Rich and Big Corporations, a Boost to American Manufacturing




The Framing of Trump's Mass Deportation Plans Matters Greatly

A conservative framing of Trump's plan wins support from two in three Americans (68% support), while a progressive framing that highlights the deportations could include Dreamers and those who have lived here for decades drives support down to just over two in five (43%).

Majorities Prefer a Nuanced Immigration Approach That Takes Care to Avoid the Deportation of Key Groups of Immigrants

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About Navigator

In a world where the news cycle is the length of a tweet, our leaders often lack the real-time public-sentiment analysis to shape the best approaches to talking about the issues that matter the most. Navigator is designed to act as a consistent, flexible, responsive tool to inform policy debates by conducting research and reliable guidance to inform allies, elected leaders, and the press. Navigator is a project led by pollsters from Global Strategy Group and GBAO along with an advisory committee, including: Jessica Floyd, The Hub Project; Christina Reynolds, EMILY's List; Mike Podhorzer, AFL-CIO; Jesse Ferguson, progressive strategist; Navin Nayak, Center for American Progress Action Fund; Stephanie Valencia, EquisLabs; and Melanie Newman, Planned Parenthood Action Fund.

About the Study

Global Strategy Group conducted a public opinion survey among a sample of 1,000 registered voters from January 9-January 13, 2025. 100 additional interviews were conducted among Hispanic voters. 61 additional interviews were conducted among Asian American and Pacific Islander voters. 103 additional interviews were conducted among independent voters. The survey was conducted online, recruiting respondents from an opt-in online panel vendor. Respondents were verified against a voter file and special care was taken to ensure the demographic composition of our sample matched that of the national registered voter population across a variety of demographic variables. The margin of error for the full sample at the 95 percent level of confidence is +/- 3.1 percentage points. The margin of error for subgroups varies and is higher.
