
- Three in five Americans believe Donald Trump's policies put wealthy people first, and four in five believe the Republican Party looks out for wealthy Americans, big corporations, billionaires, and CEOs.
- However, only a slightly higher share of Americans believe the Democratic Party looks out for the middle class than say the Republican Party does, and Americans are nearly as likely to think the Democratic Party looks out for the wealthy as they look out for the middle class.
- When it comes to the Trump and Republican tax plans, Americans are more concerned about new tax breaks for the rich than a continuation of previous tax cuts for the rich from their 2017 plan.
- Pluralities oppose Trump and Republicans' tax plans from the start, with opposition increasing once they learn more.



# Three in Five Americans Say Trump Puts the Wealthy First, Not the Working Class nor the Middle Class

Majorities of independents (61%) and Americans across racial and ethnic lines believe his policies put wealthy people first instead of working- and middle-class people.

### Divided By Party, Similarly Narrow Majorities Say Democrats Are Looking Out For Both the Middle Class and the Rich

Independents and 2024 Trump voters who do not strongly approve of the job he is doing as president say Democrats are looking out more for big corporations, wealthy Americans, CEOs, and billionaires than the middle class or working families.



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### Four in Five Say Republicans Are Looking Out for the Wealthy; Just Half Say They're Looking Out for the Middle Class

More than four in five Americans say Republicans are looking out for wealthy Americans, big corporations, billionaires, and CEOs, as do roughly four in five independents.




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### Only a Slightly Higher Share Believe the Democratic Party Looks Out for the Middle Class Than Believe the Republican Party Does

### Working/Middle Class, Lower-Income Families Seen As Deserving Tax Cut; Billionaires, CEOs, Foreign Investors Least Deserving

Across party lines, roughly nine in ten Americans believe lower-income families, the working class, and the middle class should get tax cuts.
More than three in five Americans (62%) say they feel strongly that billionaires should not get a tax cut.



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### Pluralities Oppose Trump and Republicans' 2017 Tax Law and Their New Tax Plan, Though Many Are Unsure About Each One

Pluralities of independents and 2024 Trump voters who do not strongly approve of the job he is doing as president are not sure how they feel about the 2017 tax plan or the new Trump and Republican tax plan.





### New Tax Breaks for the Rich Seen as More Concerning Than Extensions of Previous Tax Cuts for the Rich

Majorities of Democrats (92% concerned) and independents (57%) are concerned about the Trump and Republican plan to pass new tax breaks that disproportionately benefit the wealthy and big corporations.

 Intensity of concern is greater for new tax breaks, with 36% "very concerned" about extending previous tax cuts and 43% about passing new tax breaks.

# More Oppose the 2017 Trump and Republican Tax Plan With Explanation, Though Nearly One in Five Are Still Undecided


After learning more, white Americans (net -5 change) and independents (net -9 change) grew more negative towards the 2017 plan.

2017 Tax Plan Explanation: As you may know, in 2017, President Trump and Republicans in Congress passed a tax law. Some say that this tax plan gave tax breaks disproportionately to the wealthy and big corporations, giving millionaires and billionaires the biggest tax cuts and widening the gap between the rich and everyone else, while adding trillions to the budget deficit and the national debt. Others say that this tax plan benefited all Americans, including the middle class and working people, by giving tax cuts to all taxpayers, increasing investment, and growing our economy to new highs.


Pluralities of independents continue to oppose the plan once they learn more (net -15 support).

### About the Study

Global Strategy Group conducted a public opinion survey among a sample of 1,000 registered voters from January 30-February 3, 2025. 100 additional interviews were conducted among Hispanic voters. 73 additional interviews were conducted among Asian American and Pacific Islander voters. 100 additional interviews were conducted among African American voters. 100 additional interviews were conducted among independent voters. The survey was conducted online, recruiting respondents from an opt-in online panel vendor. Respondents were verified against a voter file and special care was taken to ensure the demographic composition of our sample matched that of the national registered voter population across a variety of demographic variables. The margin of error for the full sample at the 95 percent level of confidence is +/- 3.1 percentage points. The margin of error for subgroups varies and is higher.
