Trump Tariffs: A Guide for Advocates






Views Are Increasingly Negative on Tariffs

A majority of Americans view tariffs unfavorably, including nearly half of independents (49%) and 41% of 2024 Trump voters who do not strongly approve of the job he is doing a president.

- When first asked in Navigator in August 2024, 42% said they were not sure of how to rate tariffs: now, only 17% say the same.
- Among Democratic people of color, tariffs are underwater by 67 points (9% favorable/76% unfavorable); among non-Democratic people of color, tariffs are above water by 12 points (43% favorable/31% unfavorable).









One in Five Americans Are Favorable to Trump, But Not Favorable to Tariffs

Just under one in five are favorable to Trump but not to tariffs (19% of Americans), including high numbers of 2024 Trump voters who do not strongly approve of the job he's doing (48% fall into this group) and non-MAGA Republicans (41%). This group is also largely younger (54% 18-44, compared to 42% of Americans overall) and non-college (76%, compared to 67%).

Americans Who Disapprove of Trump on the Economy Focus on **Tariffs and Higher Prices**

Many Americans who disapprove of the job Trump is doing handling the economy mention tariffs and prices in tandem: many cite tariffs causing costs to go up for American consumers, which is preventing recovery from inflation.




Tariffs Also Dominate the Broader Negative Narrative On Trump, as Nearly Three in Four Report Hearing Negative News on Him


In December, 54% of Americans reported hearing negative news on Trump: now, 72% say the same, with tariffs dominating the conversation around his actions.

[If hearing any negative] In a few words, what negative things have you seen, read, or heard recently about Donald Trump?








As Americans Hear More About Tariffs, Majorities Now Disapprove of Trump's Plan

There has been a 22-point increase in the share hearing "a lot" or "some" about tariffs since December (from 55% to 77%), with increases of at least 15 points across party lines. At the same time, support for Trump's tariff plan has declined by a net 6 points (from net -8 support to net -14), including a 12-point net decline among independents (from net -8 support to net -20).



Tariffs Are Driving Negativity Towards Trump on Par With Musk and More So Than His Handling of Foreign Policy

More Americans say they've heard a lot about Trump's use of tariffs since February (from 52% "a lot" up to 58% now), and 47% of independents say his use of tariffs makes them feel more negatively towards him.

Two in Three Continue to Say Tariffs Will Drive Their Costs Up

Majorities across party lines, including 57% of independents and 52% of Republicans, say new tariffs will drive up the cost of things they buy.




Growing Shares Say Tariffs Will Both Hurt American Workers and Hurt American Consumers More Than Foreign Countries

There has been a 6-point net increase in the share who say new tariffs will hurt American workers more than help them (from net -6 help to net -12) and a 16-point net increase in the share who say American consumers will be hurt more than foreign countries (net +17 to net +33).

Who do you think imposing new tariffs will hurt more: foreign countries or American consumers?



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



(From February 2025) Tariffs on Canadian and Mexican Goods Are More Opposed Than Tariffs on Chinese Goods

The greatest gaps in support emerge among independents (net -12 support on Chinese imports, net -34 support on Canadian and Mexican imports), white Americans (net +13 and net -6), and AAPI Americans (net +19 and net -31).

(From August 2024) Framing Tariffs Matters: Americans Oppose Tariffs When Described As a Cost Increase

Highlighting that a 10% tariff on all imported goods would mean that "the average American would pay more than \$1,500 a year in higher prices" leads a majority to oppose tariffs (net -28 support).

Most Concerning on Trump's Tariffs: Higher Costs, Trade Wars

Top-testing concerns among independents and 2024 Trump voters who do not strongly approve of the job he is doing as president include higher middle-class costs, trade wars with foreign countries, and retaliation from foreign countries with tariffs of their own.

About the Study

Global Strategy Group conducted a public opinion survey among a sample of 1,000 registered voters from March 13-March 17, 2025. 100 additional interviews were conducted among Hispanic voters. 75 additional interviews were conducted among Asian American and Pacific Islander voters. 100 additional interviews were conducted among independent voters. The survey was conducted online, recruiting respondents from an opt-in online panel vendor. Respondents were verified against a voter file and special care was taken to ensure the demographic composition of our sample matched that of the national registered voter population across a variety of demographic variables. The margin of error for the full sample at the 95 percent level of confidence is +/- 3.1 percentage points. The margin of error for subgroups varies and is higher.
