

Only One in Three Americans Support the Republican Budget Congress Is Considering

More than two in five Americans oppose Republicans in Congress' budget plan (45%), including 39% of independents.

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


Americans Are Mixed on GOP Tax Cuts Generically But Strongly Oppose Them When It's Clear They'll Mostly Benefit the Rich

When hearing the benefits will mostly go to the rich, independents move away from supporting these tax cuts by a net 28 points (from net -4 support to net -32) and non-MAGA Republicans* move away by a net 47 points (from net +39 to net -8).

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


Few Are Hearing About Medicaid Cuts Compared to Other News

Roughly one in four say they are hearing "a lot" about Medicaid cuts (27%), compared to 63% who say the same of Trump's tariffs.

• Only 46% of independents say they're hearing "a lot" or "some" about these proposed Medicaid cuts, and just 48% of passive news consumers* say the same.

Americans Are Overwhelmingly Favorable to Medicaid and Understand Who It Benefits


Three in four Americans are favorable to Medicaid (75%), including 71% of independents and 64% of Republicans.

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
Democrats Are More Trusted on Health Care, Especially Medicaid

Independents trust the Democratic Party more than Trump and the Republican Party to both handle Medicaid (net +27 trust the Democratic Party more) and protect Medicaid benefits (net +21).

• Non-MAGA Republicans* only narrowly trust Trump and Republicans more to protect Medicaid benefits (net -18 trust Democrats).

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Best Reasons to Protect Medicaid: Coverage for Those Who Can't Afford It and Threats to Coverage for Kids and Seniors

Among non-Democrats who view Medicaid favorably, the top reasons are that it covers people who can't afford health care (50%), millions could lose health care coverage from Medicaid cuts (37%), and Medicaid covers nearly half of all kids and many in nursing homes (38%).



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The Republican Tax Plan Is Unpopular – Especially When Showcasing the Impact Instead of the Numbers

Among non-MAGA Republicans*, a progressive argument against the Republican tax plan does far better when focusing on impact (net +18 concerned about the Republican plan), compared to when using numbers (net -13).

BY THE IMPACT: Under the new Republican tax plan, the vast majority of the benefits will go to the wealthy few, while costs will go up for the middle class and working people



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
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The Case Against the Republican Tax Plan Is Stronger With an Acknowledgment That the Current Tax System Is Broken First

Mentioning that "our tax system is already unfair and rigged to benefit [the] wealthy" improves a progressive argument's standing by a net 46 points among non-MAGA Republicans* (from net +30 to net +16) and a net 22 points among independents (from net +11 to net +33).

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About Navigator

About the Study

Global Strategy Group conducted a public opinion survey among a sample of 1,000 registered voters from May 15-May 18, 2025. 100 additional interviews were conducted among Hispanic voters. 76 additional interviews were conducted among Asian American and Pacific Islander voters. 100 additional interviews were conducted among independent voters. The survey was conducted online, recruiting respondents from an opt-in online panel vendor. Respondents were verified against a voter file and special care was taken to ensure the demographic composition of our sample matched that of the national registered voter population across a variety of demographic variables. The margin of error for the full sample at the 95 percent level of confidence is +/- 3.1 percentage points. The margin of error for subgroups varies and is higher.

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
