Government Funding Debate: A Guide for Advocates

Key Takeaways:


- Few Americans report hearing about a potential government shutdown recently. Nearly half say they would blame Trump and Republicans in Congress for a shutdown, while only a quarter would blame Democrats.
- Support is higher for Democrats framing the government funding fights as supporting bills as long as they meet certain conditions, rather than opposing them unless they meet certain asks.
- The most worthwhile priorities for Democrats to push for, even if it means shutting down the government to get them, are reversing Medicaid cuts and blocking tax breaks for the rich and big corporations. Persuadable groups also prioritize stopping health insurance premiums from going up.



Few Americans Are Hearing Anything About a Potential Government Shutdown

Two in three Americans (65%) report hearing "a little" or "nothing" about a potential government shutdown; Democrats are slightly more likely to report hearing about a shutdown (40% hearing "a lot" or "some") than Republicans (32%) or independents (27%).



Large Pluralities Continue to Say Shutdown Responsibility Would Lie With Trump and Republicans

Nearly half of Americans (48%) say they would blame Trump and Republicans in Congress for a shutdown, while only a quarter (26%) would blame Democrats in Congress. Nearly one in five say they would blame both equally (18%).

If the government were to shut down in the coming months, who would you blame most?



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
In Framing the Funding Debate, Better to Focus on Spending Conditions to Support Than Opposition Unless Meeting Conditions

Roughly three in five Americans (59%) feel that Democrats should support spending bills if they meet their conditions – namely not cutting critical programs – while far fewer independents and Republicans agree with Democrats who say they should threaten a shutdown.

[SUPPORT IF MEET CONDITIONS] Democrats who say they should be willing to support the spending bills, as long as they meet their conditions: that they don't cut funding for public schools, take away health care that people depend on, or defund research into lifesaving cures

Democrats who say that without the majority there's not much they can do to stop Trump, and so they should at least keep the government working





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[OPPOSE UNLESS MEET CONDITIONS] Democrats who say they need to oppose the spending bills and threaten to shut down the government, unless they are able to stop Trump's power grab and Republicans' outrageous budget cuts

About the Study

Global Strategy Group conducted a public opinion survey among a sample of 1,000 registered voters from August 7-August 11, 2025. 100 additional interviews were conducted among Hispanic voters. 100 additional interviews were conducted among African American voters. 77 additional interviews were conducted among Asian American and Pacific Islander voters. 100 additional interviews were conducted among independent voters. The survey was conducted online, recruiting respondents from an opt-in online panel vendor. Respondents were verified against a voter file and special care was taken to ensure the demographic composition of our sample matched that of the national registered voter population across a variety of demographic variables. The margin of error for the full sample at the 95 percent level of confidence is +/- 3.1 percentage points. The margin of error for subgroups varies and is higher.

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
