### **Key Takeaways:**

- More Americans agree Trump and Republicans in Congress have the power to end the shutdown than Democrats, even more so when pointing out the shutdown would end today if Republicans would agree to a compromise on health insurance costs.
- Two in three Americans oppose the U.S. bailing out Argentina, and opposition grows when placed in context about the ongoing government shutdown.
- Three in four Americans support extending health care subsidies to make health care more affordable. Nearly four in five support with a caveat that no benefits will go to undocumented immigrants but this caveat only increases support among Republicans, while showing minor backlash among Democrats and no change with independents.



## Americans Agree GOP Has Power to End Shutdown, Even More When Highlighting Potential for Compromise on Health Care

Expanded independents\* are more likely to agree with an argument focused on Trump and Republicans having the power to end the shutdown by compromising to protect health care (net +48) rather than one that highlights their control of the government (net +22).

## Democrats Standing Up for Health Care – With or Without "Keeping Government Shut Down" – Is Compelling Against GOP

Shutdown persuadables\*\* are more convinced by a statement that does not highlight how "Democrats are keeping the government shut down" (net +10 agree with anti-Republican statement without the shutdown mention, net 0 with).

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


## At Least Two in Three Oppose the U.S. Bailing Out Argentina, Especially With Simultaneous Shutdown Context

Nearly four in five Americans oppose the U.S. bailing out Argentina with the context of the government shutdown (net -67 support); mention of the shutdown drives opposition higher across the board, but especially with Republican partisans\* (from net -29 to net -57).

(Split Sample) Do you support or oppose the U.S. government giving Argentina \$20 billion to bail out its economy while the U.S. government remains shut down?



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


### Majorities Support Extending Health Care Subsidies; Adding **Caveat About Immigrants Only Increases Support With GOP**

Three in four Americans support extending health care subsidies (73%), and 77% support with a caveat that "none of the benefits are going to undocumented immigrants" – driven by a shift among Republican partisans\* (from net +32 support without to net +49 with).

#### About the Study

Global Strategy Group conducted a public opinion survey among a sample of 1,000 registered voters from October 16-October 20, 2025. The survey was conducted online, recruiting respondents from an opt-in online panel vendor. Respondents were verified against a voter file and special care was taken to ensure the demographic composition of our sample matched that of the national registered voter population across a variety of demographic variables. The margin of error for the full sample at the 95 percent level of confidence is +/- 3.1 percentage points. The margin of error for subgroups varies and is higher.

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
